# The Hidden Benefits of Foster Care

There are obvious benefits to the process called "fostering a dog available for adoption". Families sometimes find themselves in a situation where it becomes difficult to care for their dog, and the rescue process allows them to place the pet in a situation that is safe and caring. At the other end of the rescue process, a family that is seeking to rescue a dog has an

organization to go to that can

provide a good match between the dog and family. Additionally,

strays and lost dogs that are lucky

enough to be rescued are in an

organization that can take them off the streets and ensure they are well cared for until adopted. But all of this care requires people to provide the care and affection that dogs need while awaiting a permanent home, and that care and affection is provided by volunteer foster parents.

What is not so obvious, is the depth of understanding that the dog has about going through that process. Yes, dogs express what we see as unconditional love. They wag their tails when close to us, want to be near us and lick noses, but does that love go deeper? Is the part that foster parents play important to the dogs in the process? This is a story that seems to

indicate that foster parents play a very important role.

> Last fall, a new rescue, Daisy, was placed with her foster mother, Kelly Prado. The dog needed significant physical care and a close relationship with a caretaker, goals that Kelly happily provided. Under Kelly's care, Daisy slimmed down and regained a smooth, beautiful coat. One of Daisy's high spots was chasing a "donut" toy, playing fetch with Kelly in her back garden. When it

was time to look for a home for Daisy,

Golden Gate Labrador Retriever Rescue (GGLRR) placed notices on social media and elsewhere about Daisy.

Anneke and Ray Dempsey, in Palo Alto, had lost Katie, a Lab they had rescued years before from GGLRR. Katie left a hole in their hearts that needed filling and Anneke found the notice about Daisy and called the rescue rep listed. Following discussions and filling out an application, the Dempseys drove to Kelly's home to meet Daisy. That meeting proved to be a good fit and a few days later, the Dempseys returned to take Daisy home. Continued on page 2

As a parting gift, Kelly included the toy donut for Daisy to keep.

Daisy felt right at home and became a loved member of her new family. She also "adopted" a stuffed animal of Katie's called her "Sleepie-do" which became her go-to toy. It was fun to munch on (not bite), carry around the house, take to bed, and show off to visitors. The Dempseys had kept in touch with Kelly, calling Kelly Daisy's "godmother"

and keeping her informed of Daisy's new life. They recently invited Kelly to spend a weekend reunion with Daisy, an offer Kelly accepted. They expected that Daisy would remember Kelly, an expectation that came true when Daisy's tail went out of control when Kelly came into the house, but the depth of that recognition became suddenly clear when Daisy ran, not for her Sleepie-do, but the donut that Kelly used to play with Daisy, a toy she had not used for weeks.

Daisy is happy in her new home, but

the **hidden benefit** of her time with her foster mother came through loud and clear when she brought the toy she clearly associated with good times with her foster mom. There are obvious benefits for everyone involved in a successful adoption, but there must also be hidden benefits for the dog.

# Farewell to Tiki Tommy









Early in August my friend, Tom Nigman (aka "Tiki Tommy"),

long-time Lab owner and supporter of GGLRR, ended his long fight with lung cancer. He was survived by Kona, likely his sixth or seventh adopted Labrador retriever. During his life, Tom made significant donations to many rescue groups throughout Northern California. He sent a check to Lab Rescue only days before he died.

Once, not many years ago, there were three of us, all named Tom, who met walking our dogs at

Caesar Chavez Park on the Berkeley Marina. Back then, Tom Nigman's lab was Harvey, an enthusiastic "dock dog" that Tom regularly entered in Diving Dog events. Even as Harvey began to age, Tom started the search for another, younger Lab, and eventually found Kona through Central California Lab Rescue. Tom and Kona fell quickly in love,

and Kona was with him at the end.

Tom Nigman had "offbeat" careers that most of us never knew existed. Early in his life, he was a "roadie" for big-name rock groups that traveled the world. Tom's main job was to travel ahead of the group and make advance arrangements for lodging and at the concert venues. Later in life, Tom became a marketing representative for "medical tourism" arranging for clients to receive elective surgery at hospitals in Thailand. I remember his sending me a photo from the beach at Phuket: He was dressed in shorts and a "tiki" shirt but had a pen in his pocket to prove that he was there on business. Somewhere in all those travels, Tom fell in love with all things Polynesian ("tiki"). He began buying and selling vintage Hawaiian shirts, tiki and hula dolls, Hawaiian music, and


Polynesian household decorative items. Tiki Tom traveled to

Polynesian festivals all over the West Coast and was a regular booth renter at shows on Treasure Island and in Alameda. As time went on, we three Toms, who had originally met walking our dogs, also began meeting at Trader Vic's for a Polynesian happy hour. After Tiki Tommy passed away, we two remaining Toms met one last time at Trader Vic's and ordered our friend's favorite drink in his memory, a special Mai tai. Aloha, old friend!

## Happy Ending-Gumbeaux



# **Happy Ending- Sydney**





## What It's Like to be a Youth Foster

Growing up with my mother who's devoted her life to caring for over 30 different foster dogs through the GGLRR program has been a truly enriching life experience. GGLRR

The GGLRR program is an organization dedicated to rescuing and finding forever homes for Labrador Retrievers and Lab mixes. It operates in Northern California and has been a lifeline for many Labradors in need. ## Watch Out For Splenic Tumors! By Dave Ely

Many large breed dogs, especially Labs, develop tumors on their spleens when they get older. These tumors, while displaying no noticeable symptoms, can cause the spleen to bleed and often rupture without notice resulting in the dog's sudden death. If detected early, these tumors can normally be removed without major incident. Once the tumor is removed it will be biopsied, and the biopsy will reveal whether the tumors may be benign or malignant. If benign, the removal of the tumor resolves the issue. If malignant, additional treatment may be required.

Lab Rescue recommends that you discuss this spleen tumor issue with your vet. One option for early detection that many of us in Lab Rescue are using, is an annual ultrasound on our Labs when they reach eight years of age. Because these tumors are generally asymptomatic until it's too late, these annual ultrasounds allow us to detect a developing spleen tumor early on to enable us to take appropriate action.



# Found a Stray? The Facts of Pet Ownership

"I'm not giving her up, she's my dog now. I've had her for over 30 days," the gentleman says after I identify the actual dog owner via an implanted microchip.

I already know the answer before I ask the question, but I ask anyway. "Who told you that the dog becomes yours if you keep it for more than 30 days?"

"They did," he says.

If I didn't know better, I'd have sworn storm clouds were, in that moment, filling the horizon behind me.

They. It's always "they." Throughout the last couple of decades, I have yet to uncover the members of this secretive group that started the rumor — that finding a stray animal becomes your property, as long as you've had it for an increment of time. The amount is always in constants of three: 3 days, 3 weeks, 30 days, etc.

What follows is always a repetitive discussion. I explain the same thing in different words until the person I am speaking to comes to the realization that whatever "they" told them about pet ownership is not how it actually works.

# Here's how Pet Ownership Works in the State of California:

Pets that can be legally owned are considered personal property. Your TV, your car, your clothes, your wallet, and everything else you own that is movable, is personal property. This includes your pet.

If you're out walking and find a bag full of money, it doesn't become yours after a certain period of time. The same goes for stray domestic animals.

The only legal way to take ownership of a stray domestic animal (thus preventing the original owner from reclaiming their pet, or claiming you stole it) is by adopting from an animal control agency or rescue organization that has taken the stray animal from an animal control agency after it has served a mandated stray holding period.

There are no laws to support any exceptions to this rule, and there is the potential for "your new pet" to end up with its rightful owner if the person demands it, and is willing to go to court.

I am by no means a lawyer, nor am I giving legal advice (property laws fall outside of animal control/pound services' jurisdiction), but what I've seen and read regarding who gets to keep Fido, when it comes to civil court rulings, depends on if all reasonable efforts were made to locate the owner. "All reasonable efforts" could include, but may not be limited to, the following:

- Posting in various online lost/found pet directories/ forums like Facebook groups, Neighborhood apps, websites such as FindingRover, etc.
- Filing a found pet report with your local animal control agency and browsing through their lost pet logs.
- Having the pet scanned for a microchip at a vet or a shelter. If a microchip is found, it is your obligation to deliver the pet to your local animal control agency to have them try to contact the owner and return the pet. You are able to adopt the pet if no owner comes forward and it serves the warranted stray holding period. This is the most sure-fire way to secure yourself as the pet's owner!

If your local animal control agency refuses to take the pet and it has a registered microchip, attempt to contact all individuals registered with that chip by phone, mail and email (if listed). I'd also document if an animal control agency declined to take the animal from you. Something in writing or on a recording would be your best option.

• Making "found pet" posters and posting them around your neighborhood and the neighborhood where you found the stray animal.

In addition, I recommend keeping all bills associated with caring for the pet, as this may have the potential of allowing you to place a lien, a form of security interest granted over an item of property to secure debt payment, on the pet. The owner may be required to pay within a certain time frame or forfeit their rights to the pet.

#### **GGLRR Event Organizer**

We have been granted nonprofit tax-exempt status under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. GGLRR is a public, nonprofit, all-volunteer organization.

GGLRR facilitates the placement of unwanted Labrador Retriever dogs into new homes. We are sought out by concerned individuals and humane organizations who come into contact with Labrador Retrievers. We have a spay-neuter requirement for all dogs that we place. Families residing within our Northern California service area who desire to adopt a Labrador Retriever complete an application form and are introduced to potential pets. Our purpose is solely to provide good homes for Labrador Retrievers who might otherwise be abandoned or euthanized by their previous owner.

Our service area is Northern California and primarily covers nine counties: San Francisco, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Alameda, Contra Costa, Solano, Napa, Marin, and Sonoma. GGLRR has more than 300 volunteers. None of our volunteers receive any form of compensation for their time and effort, other than the pure satisfaction of matching a displaced Lab with a loving family.

GGLRR relies upon placement and adoption donations, fundraising events, and charitable donations for its funding. We suggest a minimum donation (currently \$400) for prospective families wishing to adopt from us.
